Alvin Bahlke related the sad tale of "The Cat and the Canary."

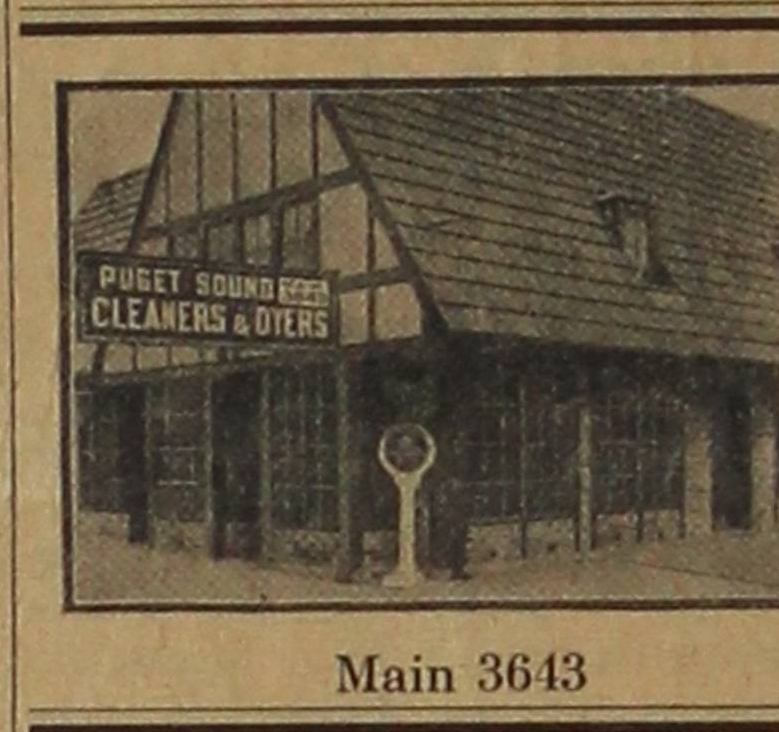
ALPHA BETA Upsilon HAS HALLOWEEN TEA
