In the second half, with the checking and shooting getting better and three minutes left to play, the score read 37-36 in favor of Willamette. Then Van Camp went out of the game on four fouls.

The second game was somewhat a repetition of the first. Before we realized it, the Bearcats were ahead 9-1. Mel Blanchard came into the game and sparked a short rally with two quick baskets, but our play lagged and the first team was replaced by the reserves. The half ended with the score 28-15 against us.

The game ended 43-39 in Willamette's favor. We made a nine point gain on the Bearcats and if there had been another five minute play, the results might have been reversed.

That same night Tom Cross wrote home: "Mom, if we lose another game, you won't need to make my bed." After two days rest we went to Pacific at Forest Grove to find a long but narrow gym. Our play in the "Keyhole" had to be modified because of its narrowness.

Coming from behind and passing Pacific's lead of five points at the half time 14-19, we won the game 31-26. Norm Walker, all-conference center, led our offense Tuesday night against Pacific, scoring 16 points.

For the first time during the four game series we lead at half time with a score 15-13. Shortly after the second half started, we forged ahead to a 10 point lead but this was cut down to a narrow margin of four points. With four minutes to go, Don Brown on two fast breaks scored four points and cinched the game for a final score of 39-31.

Jim Van Camp and Norm bagged 11 and 8 points each to lead the others in the first game, repeating the story the next night with 16 and 9 points, respectively.

If Pacific defeats Willamette and the Lumberjacks win over Linfield, the championship will automatically go to C. P. S. That Pacific can take Willamette again, however, is highly improbable, so if the Loggers are not defeated in their next two games, a tie played off with Willamette will decide the conference title.
