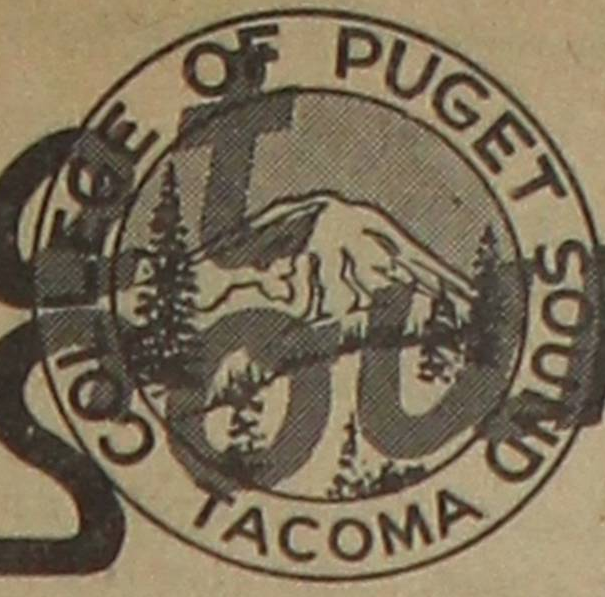

Dale Frost and Pat Jennings were second and third, respectively. The prize waltz was taken by Dorcas Eggesbo, an alum and last year's president of Lambda Sigma Chi, and Chuck Swanson, also a former CPS student.

"Anyone who would like to help in the judging, please see me," states Robert.

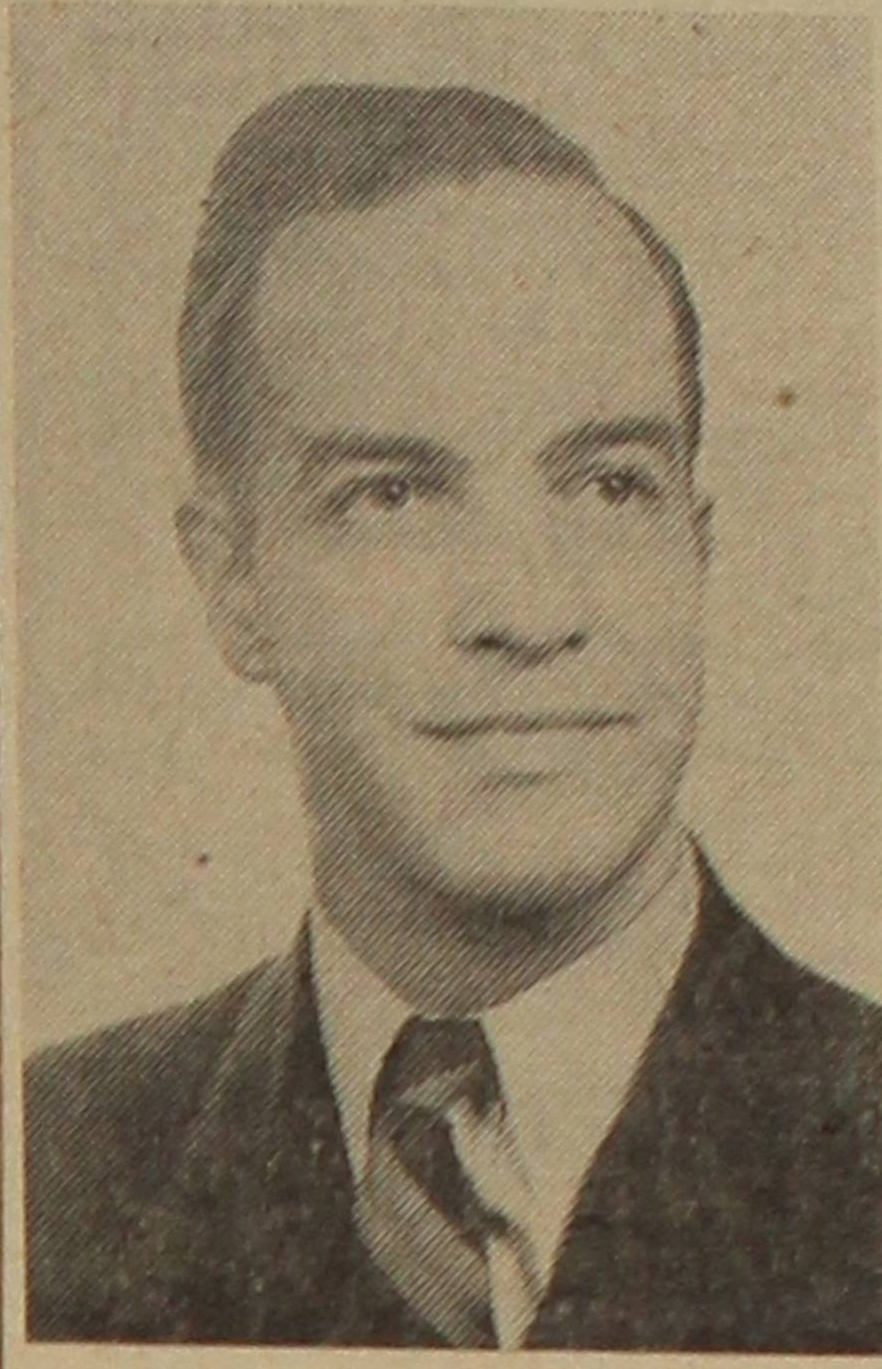
Two New Trophies

Registrar States Credits Available

Academic credits of those students who did not attend CPS last year are now available at the registrar's office, according to Dick Smith, registrar.

Ex-servicemen wishing to take advantage of their service credits may fill out form No. 100 if they were a member of the army or air force and form No. 553 if they served in the navy, marine corps or coast guard.

Students who have been out of school for a year or more or transfer students must see the registrar for an evaluation of time and credits.

"A pre-registration period is being planned, so students are asked to plan next semester courses now to help relieve the rush during registration week," he added.

General discussions will take place in the form of a round table. The main subject to be "Does the United Nations Provide the Means and Machinery to Deal with the Problems Confronting World Peace." Worth-while ideas and arguments, which are presented at Marylhurst will be taken back to the delegate's respective colleges for further study.

Mrs. Malcom Davis To Preside

Mrs. Malcom W. Davis will preside over all general meetings. Mrs. Davis lived for some time in Geneva, Switzerland, and Paris, France, where she had an opportunity to observe international life.

Friday evening Dr. Frank Munk will be the guest speaker. His topic will be "The United Nations from Within." Between the years 1941 and 1944 he lectured on economics at the University of California. He has organized training centers throughout Europe and was director of training for UNRRA throughout the world. This background gives him excellent first-hand information which will be of great interest to all.

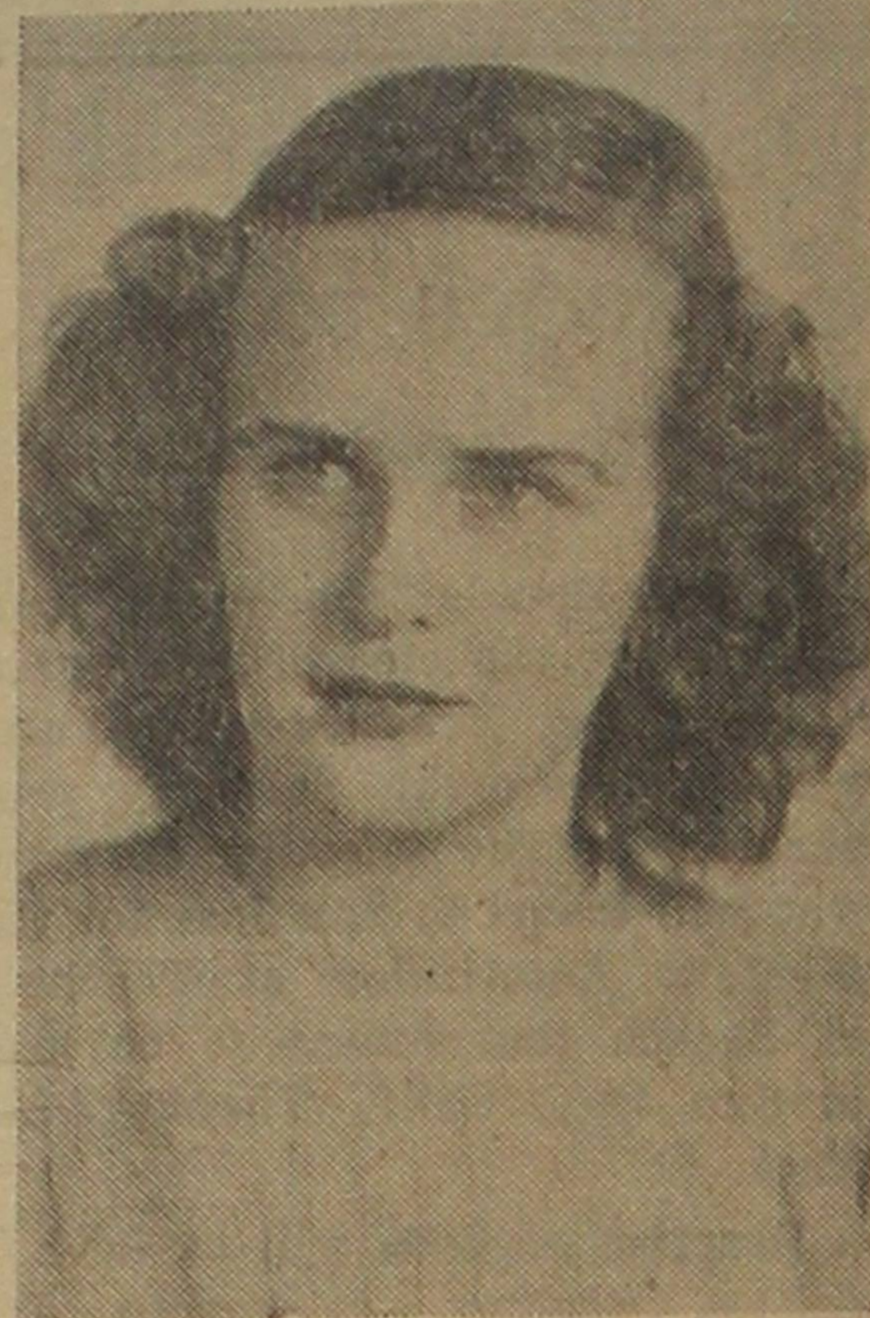

Woodrow Wilson had a plan to end all wars. We asked his party, the Democratic party, to help him build peace upon the covenant of the League of Nations. In 1920, a chagrined Republican party rode to victory on a platform that was directly opposed to everything Wilson had worked for.

Consequently, we never joined the League of Nations. The "outside world" was ignored by the one nation in whom all peoples had placed confidence. We could have given strength to his movement for the administration of peace. Instead, we retreated into isolationism, and around the world the faith for peace was lost.

Before the second World War was ended a new international organization for peace was founded. Our president wanted it to be successful above all other things. When the charter was to be drawn for the United Nations, Mr. Roosevelt sent members of both parties—outstanding members—to represent the United States at the conference. In each step of the undertaking since then, our country has been spoken for by both Republicans and Democrats.

We have witnessed a national election campaign in which foreign policy was not an issue, solely because it was a bi-partisan policy. With the Republicans in power, there may be changes at home, but we face the world united in a determination to find peace. Some people may be dismayed, and others enthusiastic about the domestic future, but we should all be thankful that we have matured enough to present one policy of peacemaking to our neighbors and to stand behind that plan no matter which party is in power.

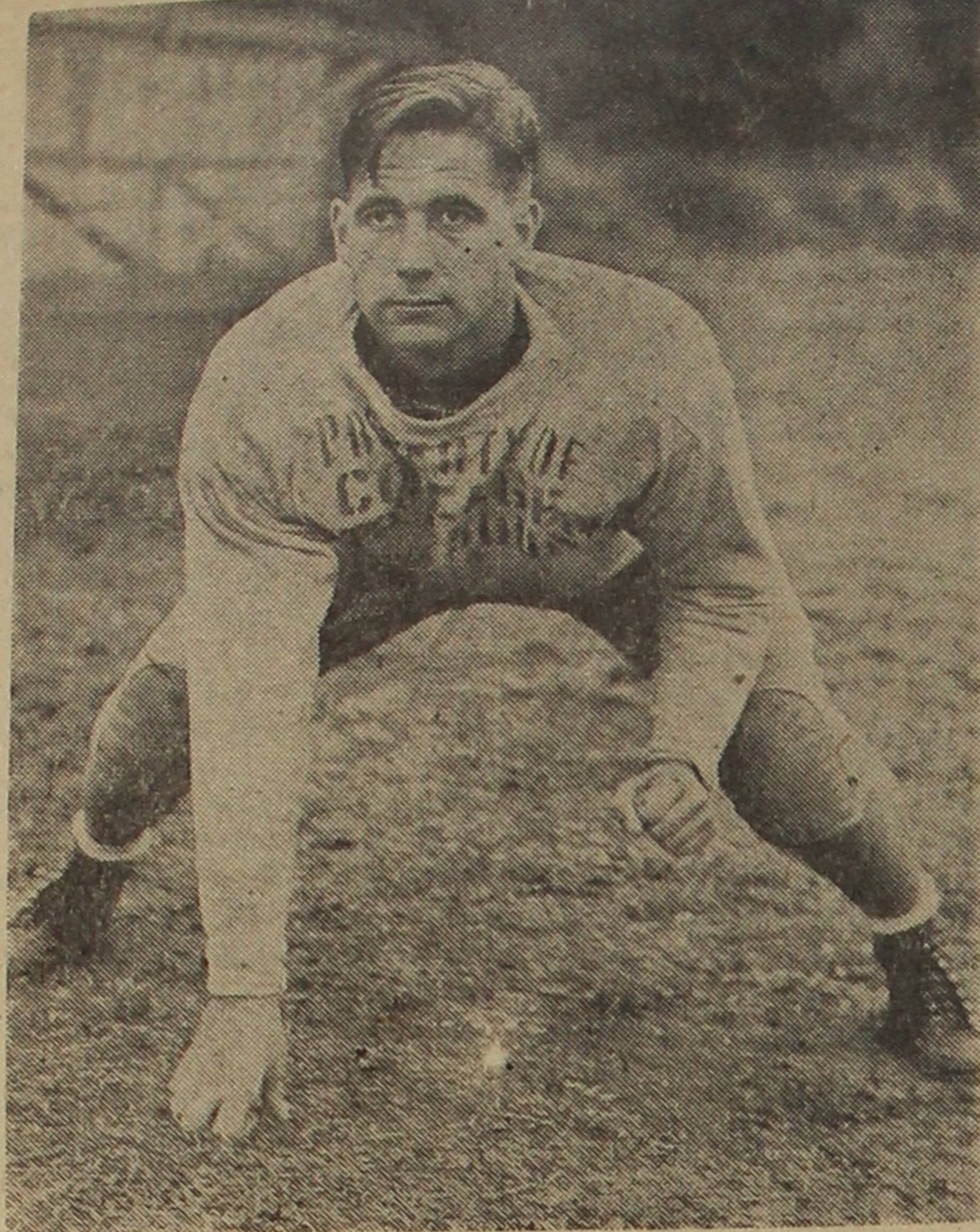
