

Have We Learned Our Lesson?

Woodrow Wilson had a plan to end all wars. We asked his party, the Democratic party, to help him build peace upon the covenant of the League of Nations. In 1920, a chagrined Republican party rode to victory on a platform that was directly opposed to everything Wilson had worked for.

Consequently, we never joined the League of Nations. The "outside world" was ignored by the one nation in whom all peoples had placed confidence. We could have given strength to his movement for the administration of peace. Instead, we retreated into isolationism, and around the world the faith for peace was lost.

Before the second World War was ended a new international organization for peace was founded. Our president wanted it to be successful above all other things. When the charter was to be drawn for the United Nations, Mr. Roosevelt sent members of both parties-outstanding members - to represent the United States at the conference. In each step of the undertaking since then, our country has been spoken for by both Republicans and Democrats.

We have witnessed a national election campaign in which foreign policy was not an issue, solely because it was a bi-partisan policy. With the Republicans in power, there may be changes at home, but we face the world united in a determination to find peace. Some people may be dismayed, and others enthusiastic about the domestic future, but we should all be thankful that we have matured enough to present one policy of peacemaking to our neighbors and to stand behind that plan no matter which party is in power.

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

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



Scoring two touchdowns in the first quarter, the College of Puget Sound defeated Whitman 13 to 0 last Saturday in the Tacoma Stadium to grab undisputed possession of second place in the Northwest conference.

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Whitman received the opening kickoff, and spearheaded by Mei Light, former Clover Park high school star, the Missionaries drove to the Logger 18. On fourth down Light was thrown for a loss on the Lumberjack 45 yard stripe. Harry Mansfield flipped a six yard pass to Ed Bemis, followed by an 18 yard blast, thru center by Warren Wood to place the oval on the Whit-

Four plays later, Mansfield tossed to Dick Robinson on the Missionary 12. Then, after a line buck picked up two yards, Bob Robbins skirted left end for a touchdown only to have the play nullified by a holding penalty.

But the Loggers were not to be denied. On the very next play, Vic Martineau threw a 25-yard pass to Jack Hermsen in the end zone for the tally. Tom Ruffin's placement was wide.

The final score came on the last play of the initial quarter, when Robbins bulled his way over from one yard out.

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
