The Department of State, U. S Armed Forces, and other governmental agencies are in need of loyal young Americans familiar with the languages. Interpreters of Estonian, Latvian, and Slavonian are listed as "desperately needed."
American campuses are being combed in an effort to find approximately 900 interpreters. People proficient in or students of one or more of these languages are sought. Second or third generation Americans whose native language is any of these are in particular demand Interpreters in the following lang uages, in addition to Russian, are also needed: Albanian, Bulgarian Croatian, Serbian, Czech, Finnish modern Greek, Hungarian, Lithuanian, Lusatian or Wendish, R manian, Turkish, and Urkranian. Anyone interested may write direct to the state department.
