Friends of SNCC Blasted In National Publication

Last semester, the coffee cup critics in the SUB were complaining about the tyranny of the UPS administration. At that time the administration had failed to recognize a group of students that called themselves Friends of S.N.C.C. Without the administration's recognition, Central Board could not ratify this group as a part of the student government at UPS, and would not allow them to use Central Board funds.

This action coincided with the free speech demonstrations at the Berkley campus and naturally a comparison could not be helped. Soon Friends of S.N.C.C. became the favorite campus underdog and the administration the common fie. However, protest never left the morning coffee sessions.

In the current issue of The Saturday Evening Post S.N.C.C. is discussed in the feature article, **Explosive Revival of the Far Left.** The Post calls the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (S.N.C.C.) "the most radical of the civil-rights groups." The article goes on to say, "S.N.C.C. is a wonder, perfectly designed to fit the anarchic student temper of today. It has a full-time staff of 230 but no membership. Its broad base is a separate group called Friends of S.N.N.C., which has 150 chapters, two thirds of them on campus. A chapter on one campus may be controlled by young socialists and on another by young Democrats, and S.N.C. C. has been 'thoroughly infiltrated by Communists.'"

The discussion will center around a report made by the Tacoma Public Schools and studies the practices which contribute to racial segregation and factors in the community which cause it. The report also considers ways in which the school system is compensating for the educational deficiencies among disadvantaged groups and suggests steps which could be taken to promote full development of equal educational opportunities in the school system. (One suggestion is to enlist volunteer tutors from UPS to help these disadvantaged students).

The causes and effects of nation wide school segregation will be discussed as well as ways in which citizens and particularly students can help remedy the situation. Perhaps the years have brought wisdom to the administration.

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
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Hale, Goman Ratified As **Trail, Cross Currents Editors**



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The film, which features underwater photography and scuba divers who encounter everything from tiny sea slugs to a twisting wolf eel and a large, writhing octopus, is a full-length color film narrated live by Frank Anderson and Jack Watson. Anderson is a Tacoma schoolteacher who produced and photographed the film, and Watson teaches skin and scuba diving here at UPS.

The subject of the film is Anderson's annual three day trip which he makes from Tacoma to Westport in his 55 foot salmon charter boat Teacher's Pet II. Several other divers including Watson aicompany him.

Many of the underwater sequences in Westport Ho! were first used in a short educational film which won a first place award at the underwater film festival sponsored by the American Littoral Society in 1964. Dr. Gordon Alcorn and Dr. Ernest Karlstrom were consultants for the biological material used in these scenes.

In addition to showing diving adventures during the trip, the film has unusual action scenes of sea lion hunting, red-hot salmon fishing, whales, and netting wild rabbits at night on San Juan Island. Some tremendous coastal scenery, which most people never have an opportunity to see, is also included.
