Endorsement Board evaluates

candidates

The Trail has always (or at least as long as this old woman can remember) endorsed candidates in ASUPS elections. However, in recent years the Endorsement Board has undergone a metamorphosis, altering its general composition and procedure.

Two years ago, endorsements were decided by Trail staff members only. In the last few elections the Endorsement Board has included various campus leaders, and this semester's Board represents the best representation from different campus factions thus far.

Participating in the endorsement procedure this spring were representatives from Senate, RHA, OCURA, and Panhellenic. It should be made clear that these people were not representing their groups in the sense that they were promoting the specific interests of their groups, but were merely acting as student leaders who have differing views on student life.

In addition, there were four representatives from The Trail on the Board. Two were staff writers, fairly new to the newspaper, Robin Stansbury and Kevin Strong. The other two were Lisa Colby, current News Editor, and Erik Anderson, ASUPS Reporter, both of whom have reported extensively on the Senate and ASUPS in general.

The Board feels it provides a valuable service to the campus through

endorsements. Members attempt to present a well-informed opinion through an earnest analysis of each candidate and a careful dissection of their attributes.

Board members read and attended candidate speeches, and attended and/or listened to a tape of the press conference.

Next, a list of pertinent criteria and

abilities, a vision and drive, initiative, ability to be flexible yet firm, and experience were desirable criteria.

Of the senate candidates, the Board endorses Alison Anderson, Michele Ganjie, Eric Konzelman, Kathleen McColley, and John

Of the presidential candidates, the Board endorses Mike Haines and also the unopposed vice-presidential candidate Julie Pyatt.

The members of the Endorsement Board wish to stress the importance of each voter getting to know the policies and qualifications of each candidate before

Endorsements are reached by a lively discussion and analysis of each candidates' statements, and the members hope that voters will take the time to reach their own conclusions without relying solely on the decisions of the Board.

The Endorsement Board, under the criteria outlined above, has endorsed Mike Haines for the ASUPS presidential postion. The Board felt Haines was the most qualified of the candidates because of his extensive experience, leadership, and potential to direct ASUPS in a positive course of action with a vision for the future of the university.

The majority of the Board has endorsed Haines, however, with some deep reservations and came to their decision after long and intense deliberation. Some members felt that Haines' rigid personal agenda may hinder his ability to objectively represent various and diverse interests.

The Board questioned Haines' character and ability to provide an equal representation of all ASUPS groups.

Arden Maynard, also running for ASUPS president but not endorsed by the Board, proved to be a confident, dedicated, and people-oriented candidate. Maynard seemed to be caring of student needs and had specific ideas on how to improve student life.

The Board felt Maynard lacked, however, necessary qualities for their earnest endorsement. Maynard's leadership experience is minimal and she seems to have no long-term vision for the development of Puget Sound. While Board members believed Maynard's sincerity in her pursual of the presidency, they could find no strong examples of personal character or experience that would lead to a more successful and effective student body.


The Endorsement Board has decided to endorse Alison Anderson because she has evidenced a strong, enthusiastic commitment to achieving her goal of becoming an ASUPS senator. The Board felt that Anderson's drive and motivation, which came across in her speeches and has been demonstrated by her work as a member of the Student Concerns Committee, provide ample evidence that she really cares about becoming a senator and about the future of ASUPS. The Board felt that her positive outlook and communication skills would be valuable assets in her role as a senator and would benefit the university community.

Some negative aspects of Anderson's candidacy discussed by the Board include her lack of specific goals, that she may tend to be too deferential to President Phibbs and the administration (based on answers given at the open forum,) and that she may be too "idealistic" in her campaign goals.



TIFFANY CARMICHAEL

The Endorsement Board has decided not to endorse Tiffany Carmichael as a senate candidate. Although she has been active as student liason to the senate, Carmichael failed to convince the Board that as a student senator she would represent the student body as a whole. Members of the board expressed concern that Carmichael would be too "freshman-oriented" and that she presented too narrow a view that might exclude the interests of off-campus students and upper classmen. Also, the Board felt that at the press conference she came across as a vague candidate with few specific ideas who did not seem to be as motivated as some of her competitors.



ERIC KONZELMAN

Based on his speeches, answers to questions, and past experience, the Endorsement Board feels Eric Konzelman is well qualified to be an ASUPS senator. During his first semester on campus, he has been very active in RHA. Furthermore, he has come across in the campaign as being a person who is both sincere and approachable.

Conversly, the Board did feel Konzelman's effectiveness as a senator may be hurt by his inexperience with ASUPS, as well as the fact that not all of his ideas seem realistic.






KATHLEEN MCCOLLEY

The Board felt that McColley's experience as the editor of *The Tattler* has provided her with valuable insight into the diversity of student interests. McColley has voiced a number of specific concerns that she would like to see addressed by the senate, including making incoming students aware of annual tuition increases and more senate participation in campus recycling programs. At the press conference, McColley seemed a concerned, outspoken candidate who responded well to questions from the audience.

Some negative aspects of McColley's candidacy discussed by the Board included that she came across sometimes as more of a "manager" than a "leader," that some of her ideas were already being addressed on campus, and that her campaign sometimes relied on painting a negative image of the existing senate.




